We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Sierra Club of British Columbia Foundation, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2017, and the statements of operations and changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes, comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.


Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Auditors' Responsibility

Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

The procedures selected depend on our judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, we consider internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2017

The Sierra Club of British Columbia Foundation (the "Foundation") is incorporated under the Society Act of British Columbia and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. On November 28, 2016, the new Societies Act (British Columbia) became effective. The Society has until November 28, 2018 to transition to the new act. The purpose of the Foundation is to encourage exploration and preservation of the earth's ecosystems; to promote public awareness of natural values; to promote research on natural resource usage and preservation; and to conduct education in order to protect these resources.

1. Significant accounting policies:

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

(a) Fund accounting:

The Foundation records its activities in the following funds:

Operating Fund:

The Operating Fund accounts for the Foundation's general operations and administration. This fund reports unrestricted donations and grants and administration fees.

Special Purpose Fund:

The Special Purpose Fund accounts for program delivery of the Foundation.

(b) Revenue recognition:

The Foundation follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are deferred and recognized as revenue in the appropriate fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the Operating Fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Restricted contributions for the purchase of capital assets that will be amortized are deferred and recognized as revenue on the same basis as the amortization expense related to the acquired capital assets.

Donated materials and services are recognized in the financial statements when a fair value can be reasonably established, when the materials and services are used in the normal course of operations and would otherwise have been purchased.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents include short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less.

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(d) Short term investments:

Short-term investments include cash, guaranteed investment certificates and treasury bills with terms to maturity less than one year at December 31.

(e) Capital assets:

Purchased capital assets are stated at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution.

Rates and the basis of amortization applied to write off the cost less estimated salvage value of capital assets over their estimated lives are as follows:

When a capital asset no longer has any long-term service potential to the Foundation, the excess of its net carrying amount over any residual value is recognized as an expense in the statement of operations.

(f) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions which affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(g) Financial instruments:

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value on initial recognition. Investments that are quoted in an active market are subsequently measured at fair value. All other financial instruments are subsequently recorded at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value. The Foundation has not elected to carry any such financial instruments at fair value.

Transaction costs incurred on the acquisition of financial instruments measured subsequently at fair value are expensed as incurred. All other financial instruments are adjusted by transaction costs incurred on acquisition and financing costs, which are amortized using the straight-line method.

1. Significant accounting policies (continued):

(g) Financial instruments (continued):

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the Foundation determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount or timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the Foundation expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value.

During fiscal 2014, the Foundation entered a capital lease for server equipment valued at \$27,425. The amount is included in the cost of computer equipment. The equipment is being amortized on a straight-line basis over 10 years. Accumulated amortization on the equipment as at December 31, 2017 is \$10,284 (2016 - \$7,542).

4. Deferred revenue:

Deferred revenue comprises externally restricted contributions received in the current year or a prior year which will be recognized as revenue when the related expenses are incurred.

5. Deferred capital contributions:

During 2015 the Foundation received \$21,283 in contributions to be used towards the acquisition of information technology assets. Of the amounts received \$18,223 was spent on capital projects and \$3,060 was returned to the funder as certain projects were completed under budget.

7. Charitable activities carried out under agency agreements:

The Foundation has agency agreements with various organizations to carry out joint initiatives that further the Foundations objectives. Administration fees are charged on cash received that is to be paid out in accordance with agency agreements. See note 10.

8. Financial risks and concentration of credit risk:

(a) Foreign currency risk

The Foundation occasionally receives monetary donations and grants denominated in US dollars. The Canadian equivalent upon conversion of these US dollar contributions is subject to foreign exchange risk. The Foundation held US dollar cash and cash equivalents valued at \$41 CAD as at December 31, 2017 (2016 - \$40,336).

(b) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that a third party to a financial instrument might fail to meet its obligations under the terms of the financial instrument. For cash and receivables the Foundation's credit risk is limited to the carrying value on the balance sheet.

The Foundation manages the risk associated with the concentration of credit risk through its policy of dealing with credit worthy financial institutions.

It is management's opinion that the Foundation is not exposed to significant interest or liquidity risks arising from its financial instruments.

9. Commitments:

The Foundation is committed under operating lease agreements for office premises until May 31, 2020 and various office equipment until January 2021. Future minimum lease payments under the leases are as follows:

10. Interfund transfers:

Effective January 1, 2017, the Foundation amended its internal policy for the treatment of administration fees and interfund transfers as follows:

The portion of externally restricted grants restricted for use towards program delivery is recognized as revenue within the Special Purpose Fund, and the portion agreed by the funder to be used for general operations and administration costs is recognized as revenue within the Operating Fund. Administration fees related to Special Purpose Fund grants recognized in the Operating Fund during the year were \$229,142 (2016 - \$25,579).

10. Interfund transfers (continued):

- Administration fees of 30% (2016-25%) are charged on externally restricted donations received within the Special Purpose Fund. During the year, \$26,579 in administration fees related to Special Purpose Fund donations were transferred to the Operating Fund (2016 \$6,772). An offsetting interfund transfer is made from the Operating Fund back to the Special Purpose Fund as needed to recover the full cost of program delivery. During the year the Operating Fund transferred \$18,248 to the Special Purpose Fund to supplement the full cost of certain program delivery (2016 \$ nil).
- Administration fees of 7% (2016-12%) were charged on cash received that is to be paid to
 external agents under contract of service. During the year, \$3,636 in administration fees were
 transferred from the Special Purpose Fund to the Operating Fund (2016 \$7,458).
- No allocation of core operating costs (accounting, human resources, information technology services, communications and shared office expenses) is made to the Special Purpose Fund expenses.

For the fiscal year ended December 31, 2016, \$61,773 in monthly allocations of core operating costs were reported as expenses of the Special Purposes Fund.

11. Director, employee and contractor remuneration:

The BC Societies Act came into effect on November 28, 2016. The Act has a requirement for the disclosure in the financial statements of the remuneration of directors, employees and contractors for financial statements prepared after November 28, 2016. For employee and contractor remuneration the requirement is to disclose amounts paid to individuals whose remuneration was greater than \$75,000.

For the fiscal year ending December 31, 2017, the Foundation did not pay remuneration of \$75,000 or greater to any employees or contractors for services.

For the fiscal year ending December 31, 2016, the Foundation paid remuneration of \$75,000 or greater to the following employee for services:
