
### HAVE YOUR SAY

## WINS FOR NATURE

The buds of spring are just around the corner, and it's been a busy winter as we work hard to defend BC's natural environment with your help.

We've faced some big challenges in the last few months, like the BC government's terrible decision to continue building the Site C dam. But we've also seen some great wins for nature and there is much to celebrate! We wanted to share some of these good news stories with you.



With your help, our Pull Together campaign has raised \$639,000 for First Nations' legal challenges to Kinder Morgan! And thanks to your pressure, the BC government has proposed regulations that could stop this Texasbased corporation from turning on the tap of its tarsands pipeline.

The federal government has introduced a legislated north coast oil tanker ban—due in part to the hard work of our supporters who, for years, have spoken up for the Great Bear Rainforest.

Our Education Team has launched two exciting new offerings: French-language nature workshops and a teacher mentorship program with monthly gatherings to support teachers in getting kids outside regularly.



Just a few weeks after the Petronas PNW LNG project was cancelled, news broke that the proposed Aurora fracked gas terminal near Prince Rupert was also being

scrapped. Thanks to our supporters for sending letters of comment opposing this dangerous carbon bomb.

In December, BC's government rejected the Ajax Mine—a win for First Nations, for residents of Kamloops and for Sierra Club BC supporters who stood with them and spoke out in support of clean water and safe communities.

## RAINFOREST ISLAND?

Time is running out for Vancouver Island's globally rare endangered old-growth rainforest

For millennia most of Vancouver Island was covered by old-growth trees, many more than 1,000 years old. Now, after a century of large scale logging, the majority of these ecosystems and 90% of the biggest trees have been logged.

#### And the pace of destruction is speeding up.

This was revealed recently in a Sierra Club BC review of logging in Vancouver Island's remaining old-growth rainforest. The average amount of old-growth logged in 2016 was more than 10% higher than the annual average for the ten years prior, and equivalent to 26 Stanley Parks per year!

Destruction of coastal old-growth is especially concerning as forests in other areas are increasingly hit by wildfires driven by climate change. Coastal rainforests can store 1,000 tonnes of carbon per hectare. Reducing emissions by avoiding old-growth logging has immediate benefits for our climate.

Shockingly, about half of this carbon gets released in clearcut logging. This is often combined with slash burning, an awful practice that releases millions of tonnes of greenhouse gases annually.

And yet the destruction of Vancouver Island's old-growth rainforest is occurring three times faster than primary forest loss in tropical rainforests. This needs to stop.


The Great Bear Rainforest Agreements show that solutions are possible. Increased old-growth protection has resulted in a reduction of up to 1 million tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions, benefitting the region's First Nations with a new source of revenue in the emerging conservation economy.

Sierra Club BC is advocating for a halt to logging in critical hotspots like the Central Walbran Valley and for an *Old-Growth Protection Act* using elements of the Great Bear Rainforest Agreements with support for First Nations and long term forestry jobs.
